Education + Economic Stability


Education is a significant social determinant that influences health over the course of a life time. Adults with lower educational attainment across all racial and ethnic groups is directly linked to important health outcomes and quality of life. Key issues around education include:

- Early Childhood Education and Development
- Enrollment in Higher Education
- High School Graduation
- Language and Literacy

Economic stability and access to opportunities, such as jobs, food, health care, and stable housing, is critical to long term health outcomes. Key issues around economic stability include:


- Poverty

- Mental Health Outcomes


47% of Westridge residents rated their overall health as fair or poor.

Social Cohesion + Connectivity


Social cohesion and connectivity goes beyond just interactions with your neighbors and community, but is tied to the built environment. Sidewalks, public space, and community spaces have played significant roles in increasing overall resiliency.

72% of Westridge residents feel connected to their community and neighbors

47% of Westridge residents had not been active in the community in the past year

50% of Westridge residents do not feel they have an ability to create change in their neighborhood

Active Lifestyles + Fresh Food

Access to affordable fresh food and places of activity, such as parks, trails, and the natural environment are significant social determinants of health.

Safety

Public safety and perceived safety is critical in creating healthy and active communities. Improved street infrastructure, sidewalks, traffic calming and lighting in the neighborhood could increase safety and alleviate crime.

68 crimes per 1,000 residents in West Colfax compared to
44 crimes per 1,000 residents in Denver

Lack of **lighting**, **loud noises**, **gun shots**, **gang activity**, and **traffic** were all cited as safety concerns.

28% of Westridge residents do not feel safe being alone in their home at night
